Dear Family and Friends,

Thank you for your many prayers on behalf of our Literacy section. I'd like to share a brief report on some of the Literacy activities going on in Papua New Guinea. Although I haven't been able be there in person, I have worked closely with the training team and "behind the scenes" as they prepared to go out to run this training course. The Lord answered many prayers as we planned and prepared and as the team ran the course.

Vernacular Path to English Course (VPE) – Ubuo Village, Gulf Province

In early March, the Literacy training team traveled by small airplane and then by boat to Ubuo village where they ran a successful teacher training course. There were 41 Elementary teachers from 9 different language groups. This course trains teachers to teach children to transition from reading and writing in their local language to reading and writing in English. During the course the teachers were also given opportunities to practice and improve their own English skills.

A third consultant is also working in a language program and is having to return to her home country for a couple of months to sort out her retirement. We are thankful that our section coordinator was able to return to PNG in March. However, she also works in a language program and is planning to go to the village after being away from PNG for 7 years. So I will once again be acting section coordinator until August.
